MOVING FROM STREETS TO STABILITY

Homelessness is a multifaceted phenomenon that involves a wide range of life experiences.

Some people living on street experience chronic homelessness, which is characterized by ongoing instability and adversity, while others might find themselves in situational or episodic circumstances, as a result of abrupt job loss, domestic violence, or an unforeseen medical emergency.

While substance misuse, mental health conditions like depression, anxiety, and PTSD, and physical health conditions, like chronic illnesses and impairments, are common among some people, others might not experience these concerns.

Encouraging successful integration into society requires acknowledging the diversity of individual experiences and backgrounds. Realizing that every person's experience is different makes their hardships more relatable.

Ignisive, at the core, provides an integrated model for Community Social Impact (CSI) and with Street based challenges being the core social issue in Camps Bay, ignisive works together with all stakeholders to reintegrate people off street and provide practical skills development opportunities that will equip someone to move back into society, into mainstream employment and independent living.



Community Safety always top of mind





Street People with mental health challenges (referred to as a Code 64) are difficult to resolve as all persons being assisted must be admitted via SAPS to a Government Hospital, before they can be admitted to Valkenburg Hospital for further assessments and observations, under Healthcare Practitioners care.

Many times what appears to be a Code 64 is someone who is heavily under the influence of substances.

This person poses a risk to themself and others as they are not in the mental state to even know what they are doing.
